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Who lives in our residence halls?

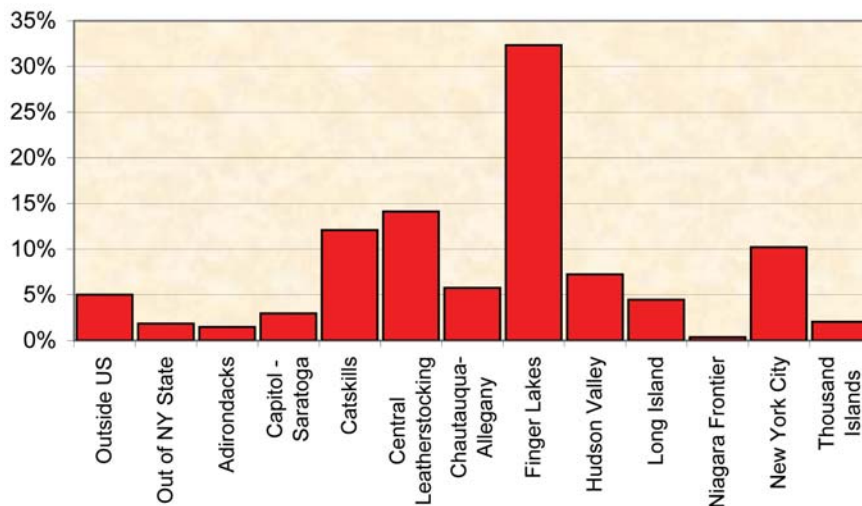
Who are the students living in the residence halls? Where do they come from? As the TC3 residential population continues to grow, it's helpful to look at demographic characteristics to better understand and serve our students. TC3 first offered on-campus apartment-style housing in fall 2000 with two buildings, and as of fall 2007, the College made a total of five buildings available.

Similar to most traditional college freshman and sophomores, the students living in the TC3 residence halls are young: Almost all of them are under 21, and most of them are 19 or younger. A third of the students in residence are from the Finger Lakes area, with the central part of the state coming in second. About 10 percent are from the greater New York City area, and 2 percent from other states. An additional 5 percent come from other countries. While the majority of commuters and residents are white, the residence population adds some demographic diversity to the College.

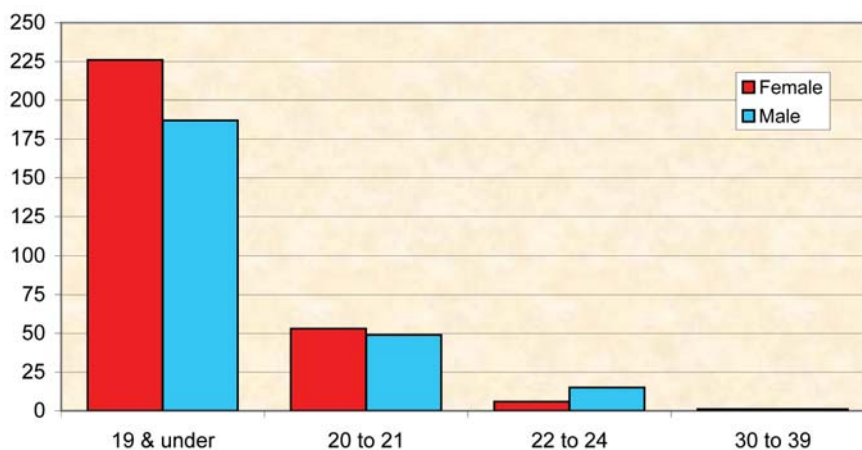
With the projected addition of two new residence halls in the next few years, the resident population will continue to grow and have an ever greater impact on the College in the years to come.
